YEAR IN REVIEW

REFLECTING ON SERVICE, SACRIFICE, AND THE ENDURING RESPONSIBILITIES OF LEADERSHIP

From powerful conversations with national leaders to moving tributes honoring those who served, the LBJ Foundation's 2024–2025 season invited deep reflection on the lessons of history, service, and leadership. The season opened with an *Evening With* Nancy Pelosi, the installation of a panel from the Vietnam Veterans Memorial on the Library's third floor, and a new exhibition examining the pivotal month of March 1968 in the Vietnam War.

Highlights of the spring included a tribute to President Jimmy Carter, the opening of an exhibition on Jaws author and former Johnson speechwriter Peter Benchley, and a visit from filmmaker Ken Burns for a preview of his documentary *The American Revolution*.

The year concluded with a 50th-anniversary commemoration of the end of the Vietnam War and a national Educator Summer Institute focused on teaching about veterans and conflict in American history.


THE YEAR AHEAD

EXPANDED SUMMER EDUCATOR INSTITUTES





TEMPORARY EXHIBITS

INTERPRETING THE FORCES
AND FIGURES THAT SHAPED AN ERA

Ain't No Daylight in Vietnam examined the pivotal month of March 1968, exploring the decisions, human cost, and first-hand experiences of the war and its lasting imprint on national memory. From the White House to the Deep Ocean: LBJ, Jaws, and Conservation traced the extraordinary journey of Jaws author Peter Benchley—from his time as a White House speechwriter for President Lyndon B. Johnson to his rise as a bestselling novelist and, ultimately, a passionate advocate for ocean conservation.





EXHIBITION REFRESH

The LBJ Presidential Library is renewing its permanent exhibition to engage a new generation in the story of leadership and democracy. The redesigned experience will explore the challenges and strategies that shaped Lyndon B. Johnson's presidency, the civic movements and bipartisan cooperation that drove landmark legislation, and the lasting influence of the Great Society and Civil Rights era—inviting visitors to reflect on how the lessons of Johnson's time continue to shape our nation today.

- New exhibits and films trace LBJ's legacy from the 1960s to the issues of today.
- Expanded archives highlight LBJ's leadership, legislative strategy, and the civic movements that shaped his presidency.
- Built to support an updated K-12 curriculum, civic learning, and hands-on educational programs.




EDUCATION

EDUCATOR EVENING

On October 23, 2024, the LBJ Library hosted educators for an evening of food and drinks, an educational presentation by Ken O'Regan with the White House Historical Association and a guided tour of our new exhibit *Ain't No Daylight in Vietnam*.



EDUCATOR SUMMER INSTITUTE

Educators met at the LBJ Library from June 23 to June 27, 2025, to explore the history of the United States through the lens of war and conflict. In addition to hearing from a distinguished group of speakers, participants visited the National Museum of the Pacific War in Fredericksburg, Texas, and watched a special screening of the film *Warfare*.



WATER ECOLOGY WORKSHOP

In a two-day educator workshop, K-12 educators learned about the history of ocean science and the ecology of water systems, dissected oysters, studied shark ecology, and explored Spring Lake at the Meadows Center for Water and the Environment at Texas State University in San Marcos, Texas.

This is a moment of tremendous growth and excitement for the LBJ School of Public Affairs. This fall, we welcomed the first-ever freshman class to our new Bachelor of Public Affairs program—an important milestone that marks the next era of leadership education at the LBJ School. As the program grows, we expect to double our enrollment and expand opportunities for students to serve Texas, the nation, and the world.

Looking ahead, we're preparing to launch a Master of National Security in fall 2026, strengthening our ability to train public servants who can navigate complex global challenges. New research initiatives are also positioning the LBJ School to address the pressing issues of our time:

The Center for Municipal Capital Markets will help governments finance critical infrastructure—schools, housing, hospitals, and utilities.

The LBJ Business Policy Forum will explore how policy can enhance economic competitiveness and collaboration with the private sector.

Throughout these changes, our commitment remains the same: to be a place where ideas are challenged with respect

and disagreement becomes a catalyst for learning. President Johnson's belief that "we must reason together" continues to guide our work. Through programs like the Patman Center for Civic and Political Engagement, we are fostering dialogue across political lines and preparing the next generation of empathetic, effective leaders.

I'm deeply inspired by our students' passion, our faculty's dedication, and the continuing partnership between the LBJ School and the LBJ Foundation. Endowments held by the Foundation now support 156 student fellowships and 18 faculty, strengthening our shared mission. Together, we are advancing President Johnson's vision of a more just, informed, and united society.

For the past decade, the LBJ Foundation has been honored to serve as a founding partner of the Presidential Leadership Scholars (PLS) program, which brings together exceptional leaders from across the nation to learn from the legacies of Presidents Lyndon B. Johnson, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton, and George W. Bush. Through the program, Scholars have studied real-world examples of presidential decision-making, collaboration, and service—discovering how lessons from the past can inform effective leadership today.

During their time at the LBJ Presidential Library, Scholars explore the Johnson administration's landmark achievements in civil rights, education, and public health, and engage directly with archival materials and personal stories that reveal the challenges of governing with empathy and courage. The experience includes an evening reception at the LBJ Ranch.

As PLS marks its tenth anniversary, the LBJ Foundation celebrates a partnership that has served over 500 PLS alumni and continues to inspire new generations of leaders to serve with purpose, bridge divides, and strengthen our democracy.
